Yet He Himself bore our sicknesses, and He carried our pains; but we in turn regarded Him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But He was pierced because of our transgressions, crushed because of our iniquities; punishment for our peace was on Him, and we are healed by His wounds. We all went astray like sheep; we all have turned to our own way; and the Lord has punished Him for the iniquity of us all.

Isaiah 53: 4-6

The year 1906 marked the death of a man named Richard Munslow. Richard Munslow was not just any man. With his death passed a job that had been around for centuries before. Richard Munslow was known as “The Last Sin-Eater.” The idea of sin-eating had come about through many Celtic communities, primarily throughout England and Wales, in the 17th century. It came about due to mixing Christian and Pagan rituals.

The role of the sin-eater was an important concept to those who had a family member on the verge of death. The belief was that a person who died still had to pay for the sins they committed. Their fear was that the sins they had committed before death would keep them from heaven. And so the tradition of “sin-eating” was created. The idea was that when a person was close to death, the family would place a piece of bread on their chest. That bread would absorb the sin of the dying person, absolving them of their sin and allowing them to enter heaven.

But then the families had to determine what to do with this bread that had absorbed the sin of the dying individual. They would hire a person known as a “sin-eater.” The sin-eater was often a destitute person whom they would pay to eat the bread. That person, by eating the bread, took the sins upon himself. He was sacrificing his soul for a few dollars, and, at least in theory, allowing the dying person entrance into heaven.

Because they were taking these sins upon themselves, they were considered unclean. They were social outcasts. Often the family would abuse the person on their way out the door in order to get him out before the sin which he had taken upon himself could contaminate the household. These people would be rejected by their communities as they traveled around, continually taking the sin of the dying upon themselves.

In Isaiah 53, God speaks through Isaiah of the coming sin-bearer (not sin-eater). The only person who could take sin upon himself would come into the world to do just that. Jesus came to bear the sins of mankind, taking that punishment upon himself, allowing mankind to come before God sinless, righteous, holy! He is the only one who could pay that price.

From the beginning man has attempted to determine how they could be free from their sin. What is the price? There is only one price: the blood of the “Lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world.” (John 1:29). Through the blood of Jesus, we find healing, forgiveness, sanctification, and the promise of an eternity with God.

The Veil Was Torn

Not to state it too lightly, but the Easter season is special. In the life of a believer, this is the Super Bowl! Am I allowed to write that, Super Bowl? Do I need some sort of permission? Oh well, just chalk it up to my rebel streak, and let's go with it!

In very, very loose terms, it's like the end of the season, and it all comes down to this one moment. This is the moment that will make history. It's the battle between good and evil, light and darkness. (I will resist the opportunity to place my beloved KC Chiefs in a symbolic role here.) It's nearing the end of the game, and it appears to everyone as if evil has triumphed. But unlike a football game, nobody could see the clock that only God was in charge of. When Christ breathed His last, all those watching thought the game was over, and the good guys lost. Little did they know, there was still three days left. It's as if the game had gone into overtime and no one but God knew it. He still had one final play to make.

In the midst of this battle, in the temple where likely no one was watching, the impact of Christ's sacrifice was manifested. At the moment of Christ's death, something amazing and wonderful happened.

Matthew 27: 50-51 -

⁵⁰ *And when Jesus had cried out again in a loud voice, he gave up his spirit.*

⁵¹ *At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom.*

A whole bunch of incredible things happened at that moment (graves opened, holy people raised to life), but the change that occurred for us was monumental. The rending of that curtain signified that access to God was no longer only available to a high priest once a year. Through the blood of Christ, paid for us on the cross, we now have direct access to God. No more annual sacrifices. No more slaughtering of animals to provide a temporary payment of our sins.

"For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God." - 1 Peter 3:18

Do you understand the practical application of this mindboggling truth? Yes, when we pray in the name of Jesus, God hears us. When we need to ask for forgiveness, He's listening, and offering it. And perhaps the most impactful thing for me is to know that when we gather as a church body to worship, He is there! I mean really there! In our midst!

"For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them." - Mt. 18:20

So, when you have the opportunity to pray or sing songs of worship, whatever form they take, old or new, simple or complex, drums or no drums, you are singing (or not singing) to God who's in that sanctuary space with us.

I can imagine that when we sing the part of our new song "Risen Savior (Sing My Soul)" that says,

*"Let the earth be filled with glory
Let our hearts be filled with praise
You are worthy, God Almighty
Holy, holy, holy",*

that this is the kind of thing that could be sung around the throne of God by every people, tribe, language, and nation. And we have the unique and awesome privilege of doing it here and now, all because a veil was torn for us.
