Fight the good fight for the faith; take hold of eternal life that you were called to and have made a good confession about in the presence of many witnesses.

1 Timothy 6: 11-12

Ever since I was a kid I have always loved sports. I have some sports that I like more and some I like less, but if you ever asked me if I wanted to play, the answer was always "yes." I loved being active, competing with others, and running. Every sport involves running (don't get me started on golf!). And generally, who is going to win the game depends on two things: who has the most talent and who is in the best shape (i.e. who can run faster and longer). The interesting thing about these running sports is that you can have less talent but still win the game because you have more speed and stamina. Running is important.

In these sports, you are always running either to something or away from something. In basketball, soccer and football you are running to the ball or the goal and away from the defender. If you are on defense, you are running towards the person with the ball. In cross country or track you are running toward the finish line, and away from the person behind you.

In this passage, Paul warns Timothy to flee from some things and to run towards others. It is interesting that Paul encourages Timothy to flee. When we think of fleeing, we think of fear: running from danger. We don't normally relate fleeing to part of the Christian walk. But Paul commands Timothy that, as a man of God, he should from false teachings, arrogance, stupid arguments, envy, quarreling, slander, evil suspicions, constant disagreements, and the love of money (1 Timothy 6: 1-6). The sinful mindsets that come from a depraved mind should cause godly men and women to flee from them. Not to casually avoid them. Not to look the other direction. But to flee.

But the godly are not to live their lives in fear, even of sin. We are to flee from sin, but we are to run toward righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness. These godly attributes are in the opposite direction. As we run towards the latter, we are, by definition, running away from the former. We cannot pursue both the godly and the ungodly at the same time. As Christians, we have a choice. Will we pursue the things of this world, or will we flee from those and pursue the things of God?

WORSHIP MATTERS

One of my favorite authors and teachers on worship is a man named Bob Kauflin. I have heard Bob speak at conferences and have come to appreciate his perspective on worship and worship leadership. While I didn't know that Bob was a part of it at the time, I remember enjoying the music of the Christian group GLAD in the 80's. He's a talented pianist, song writer, teacher, and worship leader, and now serves as the Director of Sovereign Grace Music, as well as serving on the pastoral staff of Sovereign Grace Church of Louisville.


When I read a book on worship, I often use a highlighter to capture thoughts that speak to me and make it easier for me to find them again, should I need to. Looking back at Bob's book, Worship Matters, I came across a small section that I thought might be a blessing to you. I know it has been to me.

I'll call this section **"6 Ways that Worshipping God on Sunday Should Transform the Way We Live the Rest of the Week"**. This will be a blend of Bob's words and my thoughts on them.

- 1. Worshiping God should make us humble. Worship through the use of scripture can give us a glimpse of the glory and splendor of God that will produce a genuine sense of humility in our hearts. When we get a true sense of who it is that we are coming into the presence of, and all the He is and what He has done, I cannot imagine not being impacted in a way that lifts Him up and prevents us from thinking too much of ourselves. Bob recounted that John Piper says people never leave the Grand Canyon more in awe of themselves. So it should be in our worship. Our worship should make us more in awe of God and less of ourselves.
- 2. Worshiping God should make us secure. When we think about security, some of the things that first come to mind are the police, our military, a good deadbolt lock, a good financial plan, or family and friends. But our true security ultimately rests in the unchanging love of God, most gloriously displayed at Calvary. This should be the centerpiece of our worship, reminding us that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord (Rom. 8:39).
- **3. Worshiping God should make us grateful.** You have heard me say that gratefulness is the cornerstone of my personal worship. That's the word that most quickly comes to mind when I think of why I worship. There are more, and yours is just as valid as mine, but for me, this is it. Ps. 100:4 Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Yep.
- **4. Worshiping God should make us holy.** Just the mention of that word 'holy' sends my mind to the well-loved hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy", celebrating the holiness of God. This, of course, is contrasted by our lack of holiness, and thus our need for a Savior. It sounds like something a parent would say, that you become like those you hang out with. How true. And spending time in the presence of God can and should change us. Change our thinking, our speech, our motivation, our living, and our loving.
- **5. Worshiping God should make us loving.** When we worship, we get a deeper, clearer picture of God through Jesus. We see how he loved and treated those around him. I am prone to use the phrase "God is working for our good." Jesus commanded his disciples that we should "love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12). We should do the same for those around us.
- **6. Worshiping God should make us mission-minded.** I see this one as a cumulative action caused by all the other reasons listed above. How could we not want our family, friends, neighbors, even complete strangers to know the wonderful, gracious Savior that we worship? These characteristics should lead us into action and not just keep all this to ourselves.

Deacon's Corner





Working in the school system, I find myself falling into what I can only describe as a "tired mindset" at the end of the school year. Perhaps for some of you, especially those who serve in various roles across the church like Sunday School teacher, children's worker, and AWANA leaders, find yourself tired from the work of the year as we press toward the start of a new church year in September.

There is a natural rhythm to life and to our church's calendar. Oftentimes, summer is more of a time for vacations, relaxation, and taking our foot off the gas pedal. These times are important, but we need to remember that the work of God's kingdom continues even in the summer months.

Once crops have been planted, the work of the farmer doesn't stop to wait on the harvest. They must continue to provide the environment needed for crops to develop, ensuring water, sun, and soil conditions are favorable by managing the field during the growing season of summer. It's tiring work. Hot work. Sometimes with very little to show for your effort at the end of the day.

In some ways, our church experiences a summer "growing" season, as we turn our attention from sowing the seeds of ministry to maintaining what the Lord has given us over the summer season. We do outreach like VBS and youth camp, but many of our usual ministries take breaks over the summer.

This is not a bad or unhealthy thing; however, it is important that we not stop looking for ways to keep the soil of our hearts healthy, free from weeds, hydrated in the word of God, and ready to blossom into the full harvest he has for us in due season.

Galatians 6:9-10 says, "And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith".

Are you tired from the good work that you have been engaged in? I understand. Be encouraged though, that God's work continues even if we are tired, and let the hope of the harvest ahead urge you forward. Do not give up when discipleship opportunities present themselves over the course of even the summer months. Be faithful to weed the garden of your heart and to sow seeds of faithfulness and truth in the lives of others.

Just a few verses early Paul reminds the Galatians not to be fooled saying in verses 7 and 8, "Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows, that will he also reap. For the one who sows to his own flesh will from the flesh reap corruption, but the one who sows to the Spirit will from the Spirit reap eternal life".

What we have to remember is that regardless of the "season" we are in, seeds are continually being sown in our lives and in the lives of others. Whether those are seeds of worldly desires, laziness, or apathy - or we choose to sow seeds of peace, kindness, goodness, and faithfulness - we choose every day what kind of fruit we will plant in our lives and in the lives of others.

Let us all consider and give attention to sowing good seeds every day. Even in seasons of vacation, relaxation, or rest, we still must actively choose to plant the kind of seeds that bear good fruit to the glory of our Father and the edification of the Body of Christ.


