This past month I had the opportunity to travel with 15 members of our church family to the small island of Roatan, Honduras. While there I had a chance to speak with extensively with Rene and Brooke Pizzati regarding how God is using the in Roatan to reach, not only the island of Roatan, but also how God is using them to share the gospel in a way that will reach the other continents. Some of the boat captains that travel through Roatan even reach as far as the Middle East and Africa. One boat captain that they prayed over accepted Christ, then started a Bible Study on his boat while they were traveling. We find that it is the little things life and ministry that make a big difference. In this case, a simple prayer played a role in this captain accepting Christ, the gospel being presented to his crew, and the gospel being brought to foreign lands.

Our goal as ministers is to be a part of a ministry that will have an impact long after we are gone. That was one of my takeaways from seeing the ministry at Legacy Mission International. Everything they do is designed to be self-sustaining and to be an investment that will outlast them. Their clinic, New Life Church, every conversation, gospel presentation, gift, and house visit are all designed to be an investment in people that will allow them to come face-to-face with the gospel and to spread the gospel to others.

In the passage above we find the legacy left behind Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. It wasn't a legacy based on their actions or accomplishments. It wasn't even based on their faith (although according to Hebrews 11, their faith did leave a certain legacy for us as believers). But ultimately, their legacy was based on their covenant with Yahweh. The most important thing about them was how God used them to bless their descendants. As we look at how we do ministry, both as individuals and as a church, are we focused on the temporary things or are we making investments in ministries, opportunities, and people who will continue to carry the gospel forward, even after we are gone?

### Team Reflections

"One of the most touching moments was leading a portion of the Celebration Place lesson and seeing the children who came from households where a family member is an addict. These children and teens were present at church Sunday, Family Night Sunday night, Kids Camp on Monday, came to Celebration Place on Wednesday, and back to Kids Camp on Thursday as well. Some were even present Saturday morning for a rehearsal! To have seen and interacted with these children throughout the week and then to **know** their living conditions was a powerful thing. These children are learning about Jesus' sacrifice and God's love from Christ's servants on the mission field. I thank God for all the missionaries and leaders of New Hope Church in the village of Oakridge on the island of Roatan, Honduras. They love and serve well." Ann Davis

"My most memorable moment was our home visit with Kety. We talked for a few minutes then a simple question about whether she goes to church opened the floodgates. She gave us her testimony and opened her heart to us. You could tell she truly loves God but is also troubled by her situation. She doesn't have any way out and is troubled over the thought of what happens to her if she died today. We then laid hands on her and prayed for her which was such a special moment to witness. I felt we were able to offer her a little peace and reassure her that God loves us where we are." Amy Barnes

"I really enjoyed working with the children at the children's camps and programs at church. Watching the joy on their faces as they played games or participated in various crafts brings a smile to my face even now, after our return. I enjoyed the school visits and talking to the students about Jer 29:11 and singing and praying with them. They dream of careers as police officers, teachers, lawyers, firefighters and doctors—no different than me as a child with career dreams. Watching the teachers receive their school supplies bags was like watching kids open presents on Christmas Day—what a blessing! The house visits were special. Jara and Jara Lee are twins. Jara had surgery on her arm a few months ago, but she was still in a lot of pain and didn't have a brace. A member of our team, along with a Legacy mission member, returned to her with Tylenol and a brace for her arm—an immediate need was met. To see the joy on her face when she showed up to church that night brought so much joy to me! I enjoyed our house visit with Steven as he smiled and laughed with us but then mentioned his struggle to live every day in pain. He's 27-yrs-old and has been wheelchair bound for 10 years. We prayed over him and shared how God is with him and would never leave him, and he seemed to be encouraged by that. I am in awe at the great work God is doing in Honduras." Phylisha South

"They do not look like they are listening, but they are". We were told repeatedly when we first arrived at Legacy Mission that despite the chaos around us, the kids were in fact listening. This was hard to remember, especially on the last day of Kidz Camp. Listening to Ann give the devotion to the 5–7-year-old group, I had one of the youngest in my lap due to his inability to sit still. To keep him from distracting the entire room, I pulled out my phone to take selfies with him. Thinking he was not paying attention at all to Ann, I was blown away when, after an object lesson of not popping a balloon despite stabbing it with a toothpick, he said "Because I have Jesus in my heart, he will protect me like the balloon when things are hard." This was exactly the point that Ann was making, and I was reminded, these kids in Honduras are listening and get it. They are hearing the stories in the Bible. They are hearing the Gospel message.... even when the chaos makes it appear as though no one heard." Sarah Alverson

"One of the most memorable aspects of this trip was visiting families who struggled with poverty and lacked basic resources, including medical care. We organized food distributions, helped provide for immediate needs, and spent time listening to the stories of the locals. Despite facing so many challenges, they welcomed us with warmth and faith. Their strength and trust in God, even in hardship, were truly inspiring and reminded me of Philippians 4:13, 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.'

The language barrier and the overwhelming need were certainly challenges. At times, I felt helpless, but I was reminded that our purpose wasn't to fix everything. Our mission was to offer hope through Jesus Christ, to remind them that they weren't forgotten. One conversation with a sweet lady, who sang with us in beautiful harmony, really touched my heart. She was so grateful for something as simple as a knee brace, not just for its practicality, but for the love and care it represented from strangers. This moment reminded me of 1 John 3:18, 'Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth'." Tina Largent

"One powerful memory from our trip for me is when Brian, Lori, and I were able to go with Brooke Pizzati to drop off a group of kids after kids' camp. The children were all from one of the more poverty-stricken communities. With an increase in poverty level, comes an increase in crime and drug use. By chance, we were able to meet with a parent of one of the children who had come to kid's camp. He shared that he had been battling an addiction to cocaine and that his wife was getting ready to leave him. He shared how he had tried to stop his use so many times, but he felt powerless against it. The missionary Brooke was very familiar with this family and their struggles. It was amazing to see how much she cared and knew how to approach this situation. Without skipping a beat, Brooke invited him to hop in the truck with us to attend adult Bible study that night and he agreed. He even found his wife and asked her to go with him. When he got to the church, several people with whom he had been in rehab with recognized him and embraced him in hugs ready to welcome him back even after his continued failure to escape addiction. This moment was so impactful for me because the missionaries of Legacy Mission International do not shy away from meeting people where they are in their struggles and sins. They simply continue to share the light and love of Christ to these hurting communities. They address so many physical needs, but they always point them back to Jesus for hope. #### <u>A Lesson from Otis</u>

A couple weeks ago, Sandy Brown, the Choir President, led a devotion at the end of our rehearsal that I thought was rather poignant. So much so, that I thought I would share it with you. Here's how the story went.

"My wife called out to me the other night as she ran inside the back door, "Greg, come quick! Archie [our dog] has some kind of animal cornered and I think he's killed it!" I ran out the back door and headed to the place in the backyard where Archie was standing. I could see a lifeless form of some kind of critter on the ground but couldn't tell what it was. My wife handed me a flashlight and I shined it on the poor creature. There it was, lying on its side, still and lifeless on the ground, eyes closed and mouth wide open ... an opossum.

I held the flashlight steadily above the opossum, wondering if it truly was dead, or if it was just playing. I told my wife, "You know it might just be 'playing possum' trying to make us think it's dead." I continued shining the flashlight on it for a minute as my wife took Archie in the house. Sensing that the eminent danger was gone, the opossum opened its right eye slightly and looked up at me. I couldn't help but laugh! "You fooled Archie, didn't you?" I said to the wily ol' opossum. Slowly and gingerly, the "once-dead" opossum came back to life and stealthily scampered off into the bushes. So, the Oscar for "Best Actor" goes to Otis the Opossum for his portrayal of a dead opossum in the movie "Archie Killed a Possum." Ha-ha!

What a great job Otis did pretending to be dead. I think about how he held his mouth open, how he stopped breathing, how he closed his eyes, and gave every appearance that life had left his body. But he was only acting ... just pretending to be dead so his enemy (Archie) wouldn't mess with him anymore. What a performance!

I suppose many a churchgoing, Bible-believing Christian has acted in a similar manner ... pretending to be dead, hoping their enemy (the devil) will leave them alone. If they get a little too active in their Christian walk, sing and praise too loudly and unashamedly, get a little too outspoken in their Christian testimony, they worry that they might become a target for the enemy. So, they feign death ... remaining quiet and silent... unwilling to be a spokesperson for their Savior ... barely breathing the breath of inspiration that the Holy Spirit desires to pour into them ... giving every appearance of death. But the days of acting dead are over. It's time to step into the abundant life Jesus promised. Yes, you have an enemy that wants to "steal, kill and destroy," but you also have a Master who wants to give you "life abundantly" (John 10:10). Don't feign death out of fear of the enemy. Jesus has already destroyed the enemy's power over you!"

The author is correct. Satan has little interest in those who are 'going with the flow', like a dead fish floating downstream. However, for those who are actively living out their faith, praising Jesus boldly and proclaiming His name to those around them, "Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour." (1 Peter 5:8). In fact, we are told in Matthew 5 that "<sup>11</sup> Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. <sup>12</sup> Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

I wanted to remind the Choir of this message the following Sunday, so just before the service started, I flipped a sheet over the back of the wooden Choir Director stand with the message, "NO POSSUMS!! PRAISE BOLDLY!!

I hope this is an encouragement to you in worship and your daily life as well.

### St. Patrick's Day Lesson and Craft

Patrick was born off the coast of northwest Britain around 390, into a family of Christians—his grandfather was a priest, and his father was a deacon.

When Patrick was sixteen, he was captured by a band of Irish pirates, and carried off to Ireland where he was forced to work as a shepherd. After six years in captivity, Patrick escaped and caught a ship back to Britain, where he entered into holy orders and eventually became a Bishop.

At some point after his return, Patrick had a vision of an Irishman named Victoricus, who beckoned him to "come back and walk among us." Patrick took this as a sign from God that he was to return to Ireland—this time not as a slave, but as a missionary, preaching the Gospel to the very people who had enslaved him.

Ireland was entirely pagan at that time, and Patrick ran into significant hostility and life-threatening encounters. Nonetheless, he is said to have baptized thousands, ordained priests to establish new churches, and converted the sons

of kings.

One popular story claims that St. Patrick used the three leaves of the shamrock to explain the Trinity to the Irish people: one God who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. On St. Patrick's day, we make Trinity Shamrocks by cutting out three green hearts, and drawing a heart on one for the Father, a cross on the second for the Son, and a dove on the third for the Holy Spirit. Glue the points together, add a stem, and you've got yourself a Trinity Shamrock and a simple (and admittedly imperfect) explanation of the Trinity.

## **Deacon's Corner**

#### **Discipleship - Training A Life on Mission**

Our church recently returned a short-term mission team from Roatan, Honduras and my wife and I were blessed to be a part of that team. Roatan is a beautiful place, filled with vibrant coral reefs for snorkeling and diving, beautiful world-class beaches, crystal-clear blue waters, and lush tropical vegetation - a real paradise on Earth. It is also a place that is desperately poor, broken, dirty and devastated.

It is hard to imagine unless you have seen it with your own eyes. There are truly two sides to the island. There is the picture-perfect tourist destination on the west side of the island, but at the county line midway through the island, when you cross from Roatan County into Santos Guardiola County, you find almost the exact opposite of the destination that awaits the tourists who visit the island's resorts and cruise port.

On the island, the average salary is \$12 per day. In Santos Guardiola, especially near Oak Ridge, the small village where our team was stationed, that number is closer to \$2 per day. There are really three industries on the island, the primary one being tourism, with the other legitimate industry pertaining to offshore fishing. The largest other industry is the drug trade. As you might expect in a place with little wealth, little industry, and little educational opportunities, many struggle with addictions, many are chained with the heavy burden of domestic abuse, malnourishment, lack of hygienic facilities, inadequate shelter, difficult transportation, and rampant sickness. There is a cycle of corruption in the government. A cycle of poverty among the people. To many, it seems like there is no hope. Enter the gospel. God sent His Son to the world to save anyone who believes in Him and calls upon His Name. That is what we believe. That is what our partners in this trip, Legacy Mission International believe. It is the message that has changed our lives and is meant to change the lives of anyone who chooses to follow Christ.

Legacy Mission International planted New Hope Church in Oak Ridge some five years ago. They have grown to host around 100 people for worship each Sunday. The service is in English and Spanish, not separated, but side-by-side. The church seamlessly transitions from singing a song in Spanish, to one in English, and even many mixed between the two. People give testimonies of God's work in their lives, His faithfulness to them through their struggles, these are also translated. This is worship in the Kingdom of our God.

Legacy and New Hope Church have launched countless ministries to their local community. In addition to the Bible Studies you'd expect at any church, they have a Medical Clinic which provides needed health care and medicine for \$10 per visit when the closest private clinic costs \$50 per visit and more if you need medicine. The clinic is full each day. There is a ministry to women and children who have been the victims of domestic abuse, a soccer ministry that has involved more than 150 children in organized sport, a transitional house that helps people recovering from addiction.

There is plenty more that they do, but the point is there is no shortage of opportunities to reach the people of their village where they are. Legacy and New Hope Church can't afford to wait for people to just come to them - although there are plenty who do when they hear what the church is doing - they are reaching into some of the darkest and hardest to reach areas of their community and culture with the hope of new life in Christ.

Over and over again during our week in Oak Ridge, we saw a pattern of brokenness, heartache and difficulty with believers from Legacy and New Hope Church running into those situations arms open and ready to embrace those who need the hope of Christ. While Rene & Brooke Pizzati, the two missionaries that we knew we were visiting before we departed, are certainly heroes of the faith and constantly busy spreading gospel seeds, what we did not see was them simply trying to accomplish everything on their own. As they interacted with people in their community and saw them come to faith in Christ or saw Christians join their community, they brought them into the mission with them.

The Pizzati's and their missionary colleagues are not rock stars. They are humble servants of the most high God. In truth, they are trying to work themselves out of a job because they want those around them to be able to do the ministry of the church even long after they leave.

In Philippians 4:9 Paul writes, "What you have learned and received and heard and seen in me – practice these things, and the God of peace will be with you."

They live their lives in such a way that it causes other people to be drawn closer to Christ. They speak into their lives to challenge them to pursue their giftings and practice the things they see from believers following Jesus, forever changing the community around them. They live a "Life on Mission" where every decision is prayerfully considered. Every ministry is carefully designed. Every resource prayed over for the most effective use for the Kingdom mission. God is using them in a mighty way.

As I have reflected on what I observed and participated in during our trip to Honduras, I have been asking myself, "How am I bringing others along in their faith in Christ? Am I more concerned with accomplishing the work set before me on my own timeline and my own terms?"

My hope is that it would not be the case. I pray to be more concerned with expanding the missional capacity of our church body than accomplishing the work in the way that I would have it be done. I pray that we become a people more concerned with discipling those younger in the faith in such a way that they find their giftings and use them to benefit the body of Christ and the community around them. I pray we disciple in such a way that the Kingdom of Christ is expanded as they move and live their lives on mission with Him.

Regardless of the community, regardless of the circumstance, gospel ministry is gospel ministry. We at JHBC may not be called to start a coffee shop or provide after school camps for school kids, but we are called to look for ways to use the gifts and resources our Father has given to us to meet real needs in our community while directly sharing the gospel with those we come in contact with. We are called to disciple them, to walk beside them as they learn the things of God and learn how to accomplish His mission for their lives. We are called to help them find their gifts. We are called to connect them to his Kingdom and push them to use those gifts for His glory.

Please join me in praying that God helps us to faithfully follow Him in this work and that He will be glorified by our efforts and the service we give for His Kingdom.


