When the Lord saw that he [Moses] had gone over to look, God called out to him from the bush, "Moses, Moses!" "Here I am," he answered. "Do not come closer," He said. "Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place where you are standing is holy ground."

Ex. 3: 4-5

When I was a youth pastor I loved to play games with the youth. I'd play board games, card games, and video games. But my favorites was when they wanted to play sports. Sometimes we would break into games of basketball or soccer. And some of these games would happen after church. Since I'm not smart enough to pack a change of clothes, I would play these games in my church clothes. This resulted in my dress paints having stains from dirt and sweat and dress shoes, which are not built for such athletic movements, ending up prematurely worn. I didn't recognize that there is a difference between athletic clothes and dress clothes. When I wear dress clothes I have to act differently than when I'm wearing casual clothes.

In Exodus 3 God teaches Moses a similar lesson: not all ground is equal. There is casual ground and there is holy ground. In this case, Moses is told that his sandals are not worthy to walk on holy ground. He is to take them off and go barefoot. What is so special about this ground? What makes it holy? It is the presence of God. This is an area that God has sanctified for the purpose of meeting with Moses and commissioning him to fulfill the mission God has prepared for him. But before Moses enters into his commission, he first needs to meet with God.

A mission without an encounter is destined for disaster. Before Moses can do what God has called him to, he first must meet with God. This encounter will pave the way for Moses to move forward. He has a long road ahead. He will have to deal with angry kings and Pharaohs, foreign armies, stubborn Israelites, and an unforgiving path with limited food and water. What will bring him through these struggles? The presence of the God who not only would command him but would go with him. And it all started with this encounter on holy ground where he met with God.

As we pray for God to use us to build his kingdom and carry the gospel to the nations, we must never jump ahead. Our service must flow out of our encounter with Him, not the other way around. We seek God's presence and cling to it as we seek His will for our lives, for our families, and for our church.

WORSHIP NOTES

Continuing in the series of articles based on the book *Healthy Worship* by Kenny Lamm, this next section is one that I find particularly poignant and perhaps the most applicable objective of my sabbatical experience. Again, I am forced to brutally edit the original article to make it fit on one page.

From Spectator to Participant

It is easy to attend worship without truly participating in it. You can sit in the room, hear the songs, follow the service, and still remain emotionally distant. You can observe everything happening around you and never really engage your heart, mind, or will. That is what makes this issue so important: Worship was never meant to be watched from a distance. Healthy worship calls us to move from spectator to participant.

WORSHIP IS NOT A SHOW

In many settings, people have learned to treat church like a performance. A few people are on stage. Everyone else is watching. The quality of the experience gets evaluated afterward. But biblical worship is not entertainment. It is not something a few gifted people do while everyone else observes. Worship is the gathered response of God's people to the greatness of God.

PARTICIPATION IS PERSONAL

When you participate in worship, you are doing more than singing the words on a screen. You are bringing your attention. You are bringing your honesty. You are bringing your trust. You are bringing your repentance. You are bringing your joy, your grief, and your desire to respond to God. That kind of participation is deeply personal. It means you are not asking, "Did I enjoy this?" as your first question. Instead, you are asking, "Did I encounter God? Did I respond to Him? Did I offer myself to Him?" That is a very different mindset.

PARTICIPATION IS WHOLE-HEARTED

True worship involves more than passive agreement. It includes the mind, as we think truthfully about God. It includes the heart, as we feel awe, gratitude, and conviction. It includes the will, as we choose obedience. It includes the body, as we sing, pray, kneel, lift our hands, or simply remain attentive with reverence.

THE CHURCH NEEDS PARTICIPANTS

A worshipping church is stronger when people come ready to engage. When people sing, pray, listen, and respond, the whole body is strengthened. One person's faith can encourage another. One person's joy can lift the room. One person's honesty can help others be honest too. That is why passive attendance is not enough.

A SIMPLE INVITATION

If you find yourself drifting into spectator mode, start small. Pay attention to the words of the songs. Pray before the service. Ask God to speak to you. Sing even if you do not feel like it. Listen with expectation. Respond with sincerity.

WHY IT MATTERS

Healthy worship changes when the people of God stop watching and start offering themselves. It becomes less about style. Less about critique. Less about passivity. And more about God's worth. More about the gospel. More about whole-hearted response. That is the kind of worship that shapes a church, strengthens believers, and honors Jesus. Healthy worship begins when spectators become participants.

THE UNEXPECTED

The boat was sailing across the lake. The lake that they had known their whole lives. Countless hours spent surrounding this body of water in all kinds of vessels. Decades of experience navigating the waters and piloting boats sat capably on board.

Surely, they had it under control. Surely they could manage the wind against their ship. There was not a question in their experienced minds that they would reach their intended destination by the work of their own hands.

But as they worked what they could to cross the sea, their progress was slowed, their progress delayed because God had a better plan. He needed to show them something.

It was the fourth watch of the night. This would have been between 3 and 6 AM. They'd been beaten by the waves, strained against the wind, and had not reached where they had planned. Jesus was going to show up, but they weren't ready for Him. They weren't expecting Him to show up, at least not in this way.

They saw a ghost on the water, coming toward the boat, they cried out in fear. Screaming in terror at the figure making its way across the rough seas, they heard a familiar voice. The voice of their teacher. The voice of their friend. The voice of their Lord.

Jesus called to His disciples in the boat "Take heart; it is I. Do not be afraid." The God who made the universe, the Son of Man who commands all things; came WALKING out on the water to his struggling followers.

They knew how to sail. They were fishermen. They knew how to navigate and pilot through storms. But when God is ready to teach you a lesson, when he is ready to reveal something about Himself, about His world, or about yourself - there is no amount of your own effort that will hasten your destination.

After hours of struggle, the time had come for Jesus to demonstrate to His disciples that He holds all things in His hands - all power in Heaven and on Earth is given to Him. He walked on the water. Across the surface of the sea, not just because He could, but to teach His followers a lesson. He won't always show up in the way you expect.

As his teacher is walking on the water, Peter calls out, seemingly doubting that it really is Jesus and not the ghost that they initially thought, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." Jesus told him to get out of the boat, and to Peter's credit he did. For a moment, Peter in fact stayed above the water. It was only when Peter took his eyes and mind off of the power that Jesus was providing him, distracted by the circumstances around him - the wind, the waves, the storm around, the implausibility of his ability to do this - that he began to sink.

Still another lesson to be taught, Jesus graciously reaches out his hand and saves Peter from the waters.

In our lives and in our church family, we make our plans, we set our expectations of how and when God will show up. We set our schedules of when God will be with us and we can move out in faith with Him by our side. But God's timeline isn't ours.

It is tempting when we are in the midst of things going differently than we had planned to be frustrated and work even harder to do what we know our ability should allow us to accomplish. But oftentimes, delays are a time to wait on God to move. To wait on God to show up and teach us something we didn't realize, to see something new about who He is.

For me, my prayer is that as we are embattled in the wind and waves of our lives and in the life of our church, that we will be prepared in our hearts for God to show up in unexpected ways to grow His Kingdom at JHBC and in our community while lifting our eyes and hearts in dependence on Him.

When Jesus comes across the waters of your life, will you be expecting Him? Will you be prepared to welcome our teacher and Savior in unexpected ways and at unexpected times? Will you be prepared to be singularly focused on Him and allow Him to accomplish unimaginable, miraculous things through the power He freely gives to His children?

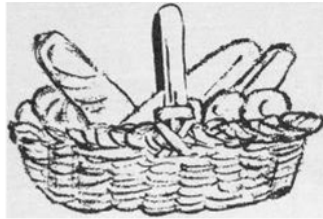

Jonesboro Heights Baptist Church was asked over a year ago to host the 2026 IGNITE Missions Conference for WMU NC on that weekend. We are centrally located and WMU NC saw JHBC as a very mission minded/focused church and we are so excited!! Hosting the IGNITE Missions Conference will take everyone at JHBC to make it happen. The expectation is that we will have 300+ attendees coming to this conference to learn more about mission opportunities, prayer needs for our missionaries and to be uplifted in our efforts to share the gospel at home and around the world.

We need lots of volunteers for this event. WMU NC will take care of many details but we need to have volunteers to make it all happen smoothly. We need volunteers to handle traffic on both Friday night and Saturday events. We NEED 2 golf carts to transport attendees from the East side and Main Street parking lots to the portico at McDowell Hall (for those who cannot walk the distance). McDowell Hall will be the registration entry point. Volunteers are needed to direct our guests to the breakout rooms, to smile and give a warm welcome, assist those who need the chair lift to get to the upper floors, help set up on Thursday and take down after the event Saturday to get ready for Sunday morning. If you helped with the BASH, you know it takes a lot of people to make an event like this happen.

If you are willing to volunteer you can attend the conference without paying the registration fee. If you are a member of WMU there are some limited scholarships to help with the cost of registration (if not volunteering). If you just want to come and enjoy the conference without any distractions the cost is \$55. This cost includes dinner on Friday night and lunch on Saturday. Powell River Associational Shoe Fair & Sandy Creek Baptist Association MISSION REPORT

DATE: Thursday, July 30, 2026 - Saturday, August 1, 2026

There were 20 people representing our Sandy Creek Baptist Association who traveled to the Powell River Baptist Association complex in Jonesville, Virginia to conduct their annual Shoe Fair. Of those 20 people we had 6 churches represented. This is an annual mission in which Sandy Creek Churches have participated in for 12 years, beginning in 2014. The team took over 800 pairs of shoes, 100's of socks, hygiene kits and school supplies. Gideon New Testaments were given out during the event to each child or parent who wished to have one. There were 13 Associational churches that contributed and 35 people who worked during the collection day on Monday, July 27th, representing 8 churches.

The team fitted 240 pairs of shoes on children during the shoe fair on Friday and Saturday, representing 100 Families. 300 pairs of shoes along with socks were taken to another school district in Elydale, the Eastern part of Lee County, Virginia where they will be distributed by the staff of area schools during their open houses this week. Shoes will be distributed at Powell River throughout the school year as needed. Thousands of shoes have been fitted on school children over the years.

The mission team of 2026 wishes to thank everyone who contributed, shoes, socks, hygiene items, school supplies and money for this mission. Without your support, this mission would not be successful. You are a blessing to us.
